#### **NAN FRASER - AN APPRECIATION**

Everyone will have their own memories of Nan, late wife of Rev Donald Fraser, but I hope that some of my thoughts resonate with you and that they go some way to expressing what a special person she was.

I met Donald and Nan soon after arriving in Monifieth in August 1989. I was very recently married, was starting out on a completely new job as a supply primary teacher in an area I did not know at all and wanted to find a new church family. I went to services with the three different congregations, but it was at the South Church that I felt most at home then.

True to form, Nan was very welcoming and through chatting, we discovered some connections that instantly made me feel at ease - like my mum, Nan was a teacher of Home Economics. In a wonderfully comforting link, Nan had trained in Aberdeen alongside - and remained very friendly with - a colleague of my mum's who was also the mum of one of my school friends in Keith. Nan's genuine interest in people shone through all she did. Nan soon introduced me to the members of the Young Women's' Group and encouraged me to join (none of us is so young now but these ladies are still very special to me). Later, it was Nan who involved me in Sunday School, including helping with the annual Nativity play and taking part in the Sunday School picnic and barbecue in the Manse Garden. There was always humour and fun along with the hard work.

At an early stage Nan helped out when, in the days before we owned a computer, my husband had to prepare a PowerPoint presentation for a job interview. Nan arranged that he would have the loan of an Apple computer for the weekend.

When our children came along, Nan was interested and supportive. Both Matthew and Kirsten went through Sunday School in the South Church and enjoyed Youth Group with Nicky in the South Church Manse once Monifieth Parish Church was established. Nan was always around, keeping up with the young people's news, revelling in their successes and commiserating when things did not go so well. As Kirsten told me on hearing of Nan's death, "Nan was very special to me".

As a congregation now we derive so much, both financially and by connecting with the community, from the annual Bake and Book, including the sale of freshly made pancakes. These are legacies of Nan's inventiveness, her enjoyment of being with people, doing good for others and her ability to encourage support of a good plan.

Looking back at these short memories, it is easy to see so many aspects of Nan's personality - she was a great communicator, who listened and remembered; an encourager, recognising people's talents, skills and qualities even when they did not know them themselves; a giver of practical help, without fuss or fanfare; a friend to all, whether she had known you for years or had just met you; a seemingly tireless support to Donald in church work and family matters.

As a staunch Guild member, Nan truly lived out the motto of that organisation - Whose we are and whom we serve - in all aspects of her life.

#### MIDWEEK SERVICES IN MURROES CHURCH HALL

One of the innovations which came about with the birth of Monifieth South Angus Church of Scotland has been midweek worship. This concept was new to most and welcomed by some; it was also greeted with dismay or disappointment, even with promises of a boycott. Every new thing evokes such responses, veering from the negative to the positive. Even the new minister will not be immune!

In the light of all this, I'm delighted to be able to report that the midweek services have found a place in the diaries of some of our members. "Fans" have brought along friends. People have been found to cover rotas for the all-important teas and flowers – for there is no doubt that the fellowship following worship is part of the experience, and the flowers are delivered to members who for a variety of reasons are going through tough times (or celebrating a special event).

So far we have been managing without other rotas, as everyone pitches in to help with such things as arranging the chairs and tables, putting out the hymnbooks etc. though I'd like to say a big thankyou to Ian who put the heating on in the colder months.

The format of the service is fairly traditional, as the move to the hall and midweek has been enough of a change without altering the usual order of things. We sing well known hymns, usually from CH4 though we also have Junior Praise, and are fortunate to have Clive playing for us almost every week (Clive was organist in Monikie Church).

In the future, and depending on who is leading worship, other formats may be tried. I did use PowerPoint for the hymn words and some pictures at one service, given that we have a large screen in the hall and it was easy to arrange the chairs to enable everyone to see it. Ideas for future services would be welcome!

If you haven't yet come along to the midweek service, may I invite you to give it a try, perhaps if you have to miss a Sunday, or just miss the people you used to see in the pews.

Until the clocks change, we meet on Wednesdays at 6.30 pm; the worship leader for the week is included in the Notices. There is plenty of space for parking at the hall – you can park almost outside the entrance door if you need to, and there is a short shallow ramp from path to door. We have two toilets as well as the kitchen and chapel, in addition to the main hall.

Above all, we offer you a warm welcome!

It was a lovely day, the sun was shining and the fair ground down on the shore competed with us for children attending. Nevertheless, we had a fun time with the small number there who created craft items relating to Pentecost. Perhaps it would have been a better day to have had our seashore event which took place at the end of April, although we would have had to compete with the funfair. The seashore event was a chilly but well attended afternoon when we had various craft activities, a picnic and singsong before heading to the beach to make sandcastles and generally have fun. The Messy Church team also helped at the congregational picnic, on the 2<sup>nd</sup> June, in Monikie Park. The next Messy Church will be in September – date to be confirmed.

#### **GUILD AT MONIFIETH**

On February 26th we had a very pleasant evening when Broughty Ferry Guild joined us to hear a talk on 'Home for Good' one of our projects. Unfortunately, our speaker was unwell, but sent a video to explain the work they did. The organisation tries to find foster carers or adoptive parents for some of the 10,000 children in the care system. They feel every child deserves a home, but there is a desperate shortage of foster carers. They work with many churches and faiths to help new carers on their journey to fostering and perhaps adoption. Teenagers need the most help but wait the longest to be fostered (if at all) and miss the benefits of being part of a family. They are a small charity but champion many support groups and a network of helpers and volunteers. We hope the donations they get by being one of the Guild's projects will help them in their work. We had an interesting talk on 11th March from Gordon Anthony, a local author. He suffers from an inherited visual disease, and as he doesn't like dogs, he uses a white stick to get around. He has an Open University degree in Ancient History and started writing for his own amusement. He writes fiction based on reality and actual events and finds research heavy going. He uses all the available technology on his phone and P.C. and his P.C. also has a built in screen reader. He has learnt to touch type and uses an operating system to navigate the files on his computer. As he can't use a mouse, he relies on his proof readers to correct his spelling.

He has now written many books and at the moment has a special interest in the Royal Flying Corps in the First World War. We wish him continuing success in his career.

At our A.G.M on 25th March the names of some speakers were suggested, our funds were distributed, the same leadership team was chosen, and we then enjoyed our 'Bring and Share Supper'.

We hope to hold a 'Welcome Back' coffee morning for Guild members and potential members on Saturday August 31st at 10pm. This has yet to be confirmed and will be intimated on a Sunday nearer the date.

The new Session will start again on September 9th at 7.15 in the Rattray Hall.

The leadership team would like to thank all our members and all those who have supported our fundraising events. We hope you will have a happy and blessed summer and to see you all in September.

We meet on Wednesday evenings during school term time in Monifieth South Angus Parish Church on Monifieth High Street from 6.30-8.30pm. It is open for people outwith Monifieth and caters for P7 upwards. It is run by volunteers, all PVG checked, and it is a place where young people can come together in an inclusive environment to have fun, make friends and learn from each other. As routine is important for young people with autism we set up activities in a similar way each week. There is a craft table, food/baking activity, games or just chill and chat. There is no charge.

This money will be used to purchase some bagpipe reeds etc. We would all like to thank all for their generosity and support with this venture.

# **Company Update**

All our Sections (Anchors, Junior, Company, Senior and Pipe Band) have now moved into the Monifieth South Angus Parish Church building, on the High Street of Monifieth. While there are still some teething problems, most of our activities are now continuing as they should. As mentioned in the March issue of the IMPACt, our Anchors and Juniors visited the R.N.L.I. Lifeboat Station in Broughty Ferry. All the boys and leaders had a very interesting evening, hearing about how the actual Lifeboat Station operates and learning what an important role all the service men and woman, in the R.N.L.I. have, in trying to keep everyone safe in rivers and waters around Scotland and the UK.

Recently, we finished off our year by taking all the boys in the Anchors and Juniors on a day trip to Brechin Castle Country Park. Unusually, the weather was warm and sunny, meaning all the boys and leaders had a great day out.

#### Summer Camp 2024

After having another very successful camp last year, at Boat of Garten Community Centre, while the number of boys attending was actually down on previous years, we had no hesitation in booking the same site again for this year's camp. This year the Camp is being held from Saturday 30<sup>th</sup> June until Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> July.
